



Belleconia[™] Hot Orange Begonia Begonia 'Belleconia Hot Orange'

Hardiness Zone: (annual)

Group/Class: Tuberous Begonia Hybrid

Description:

An outstanding trailing begonia presenting lovely sea-green leaves with fine red edges; hot orange double flowers are produced throughout the season; grows well in humid conditions; great spiller for containers, or hanging baskets

Ornamental Features

Belleconia Hot Orange Begonia features dainty nodding double orange orchid-like flowers with scarlet overtones at the ends of the stems from mid spring to early fall. Its attractive serrated heart-shaped leaves emerge light green in spring, turning dark green in colour with distinctive red edges the rest of the year.

Landscape Attributes

Belleconia Hot Orange Begonia is an herbaceous annual with a mounded form. Its medium texture blends into the garden, but can always be balanced by a couple of finer or coarser plants for an effective composition.

This is a high maintenance plant that will require regular care and upkeep, and usually looks its best without pruning, although it will tolerate pruning. Deer don't particularly care for this plant and will usually leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. Gardeners should be aware of the following characteristic(s) that may warrant special consideration;

- Insects
- Disease

Planting & Growing

Belleconia Hot Orange Begonia will grow to be about 10 inches tall at maturity, with a spread of 12 inches. When grown in masses or used as a bedding plant, individual plants should be spaced approximately 8 inches apart. Its foliage tends to remain low and dense right to the ground. Although it's not a true annual, this plant can be expected to behave as an annual in our climate if left outdoors over the winter, usually needing replacement the following year. As such, gardeners should take into consideration that it will perform differently than it would in its native habitat.

This plant does best in partial shade to shade. It requires an evenly moist well-drained soil for optimal growth, but will die in standing water. It is not particular as to soil pH, but grows best in rich soils. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution, and will benefit from being planted in a relatively sheltered location. Consider applying a thick mulch around the root zone over the growing season to conserve soil moisture. This particular variety is an interspecific hybrid. It can be propagated by cuttings; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.

Belleconia Hot Orange Begonia is a fine choice for the garden, but it is also a good selection for planting in outdoor containers and hanging baskets. It is often used as a 'filler' in the 'spiller-thriller-filler' container combination, providing a mass of flowers and foliage against which the thriller plants stand out. Note that when growing plants in outdoor containers and baskets, they may require more frequent waterings than they would in the yard or garden.
